★ COWBOYS & STEELERS ★

Preseason Series: The Cowboys and Steelers have met 14 times in the preseason, and the series is tied at seven wins apiece. This is the first time since 2003 Dallas and Pittsburgh will square off in the preseason.

Preseason Notables: Through 14 preseason games, Dallas has traveled to Pittsburgh just once while the Steelers have made 13 hauls to Dallas. This season, Pittsburgh is the home team for the Hall of Fame Game, so Dallas will have traveled just twice in 15 games to play Pittsburgh in the preseason.

Regular Season Series: The Cowboys and Steelers have faced each other 30 times, with Dallas winning 16 of those contests.

Postseason Series: Dallas and Pittsburgh have met in three Super Bowls - X, XIII and XXX, and the Steelers have won two.

★ Cowboys Summer Training Camp ★

The Dallas Cowboys returned to Oxnard, California to open their 62nd training camp in 2021 after training in Frisco, Texas for the entirety of the 2020 training camp due to COVID-19.

This year marks the 15th time the Cowboys will have spent at least a portion of their training camp in Oxnard and the 41st overall training camp in California.

Dallas came back to the west coast after training in the Alamodome in San Antonio prior to the 2011 season. Since 2001, the Cowboys have held training camp in Oxnard (2001, 2004-06, 2008, 2010, 2012-19 and 2021), and/or Wichita Falls (2001) and/or San Antonio (2007, 2009, 2010 and 2011) and/or Frisco (2017-18, 2020).

Dallas will also hold a portion of training camp at its home in Frisco, Texas, the fifth time the Cowboys will have training camp practices in Frisco.

★ Training Camp History ★

June 3, 1960 – The newly formed Dallas Cowboys franchise announced that it will train at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon. Rookies reported on July 9.

May 24, 1961 – Due to its proximity to their first exhibition game against Minnesota in Minneapolis, the Dallas Cowboys moved training camp to St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. Camp opened on July 9.

June 8, 1962 – The Dallas Cowboys moved their training camp site to the campus of Northern Michigan College on the shores of Lake Superior in Marquette, Mich. Rookies reported on July 13.

July 12, 1963 – Because the team played three of its first four preseason games on the west coast, the Dallas Cowboys moved training camp to California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. This camp, which was the first of 27 at CLC, opened on July 12.

Dec. 6, 1989 – For the first time in the 30-year history of the team, the Dallas Cowboys trained in Texas as the club announced its 1990 training camp would be held at St. Edward's University in Austin, Texas. This camp, the first of eight at St. Ed's, opened on July 22.

Feb. 17, 1998 – The Cowboys began a four-year stay at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas, with their 1998 camp. The first camp at Midwestern State University opened on July 16. In 2001, the Cowboys split camp between Midwestern State and the Residence Inn in Oxnard, Calif., spending two weeks at each location.

May 17, 2002 – The Cowboys continued their commitment to fans in the state of Texas by announcing the 2002 training camp will take place at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas. The camp, which ran for four weeks, opened on July 26. The Cowboys returned to the Alamodome again in 2003.

Oct. 24, 2003 – The Cowboys announced a return to California for training camp. For the 2004-06 seasons, the Cowboys conducted their entire training camp in Oxnard, Calif., at the Residence Inn at River Ridge, using practice fields provided by The City of Oxnard. The Cowboys opened their first returned camp on July 30, 2004.

May 4, 2006 – The Dallas Cowboys announced a five-year commitment to once again call the City of San Antonio its summer home beginning in 2007. The Alamodome, which played host to Cowboys training camps in 2002 and 2003 was again the site for the team's summer practice sessions.

Summer, 2010 – The Dallas Cowboys held a split camp, spending the first portion in the Alamodome in San Antonio and the second at the Residence Inn at River Ridge in Oxnard.

July, 2012 – The Dallas Cowboys returned to Oxnard, California for all of training camp at the Residence Inn at River Ridge after spending the 2011 training camp in San Antonio at the Alamodome.

August, 2017 – After spending the first four weeks of training camp in Oxnard, California, the Dallas Cowboys returned home to hold their first ever training camp practices at their new practice facility at The Star in Frisco. Six training camp practices were held inside Ford Center and open to the public.

August 2020 – For the first time in franchise history, the Cowboys spent all of training camp at The Star in Frisco due to COVID-19 restrictions.

July 2021 – The Cowboys return to Oxnard, California for training camp after spending 2020 training in Frisco.

★ WINNING HEAD COACH ★

The Dallas Cowboys named Mike McCarthy the ninth head coach in franchise history on Jan. 5, 2020. Along with 13 years of head coaching experience and 13 additional years as an assistant coach in the NFL, McCarthy came to Dallas with a 125-77-2 regular season coaching record - all with the Green Bay Packers (2006-18).

With a 6-10 record in 2020, he owns the sixth-most wins (29th all-time) and seventh-highest winning percentage among qualifying active NFL coaches. His teams have qualified for the postseason nine times, won six NFC North Division titles, made four NFC Championship Game appearances and took home a Super Bowl XLV championship.

★ COWBOYS IN CANTON ★

This year marks the seventh time the Dallas Cowboys will play in the Hall of Fame Game. The first time was in 1968, and the last was in 2017. Overall, Dallas is 3-3 in the game:

★ PERSONNEL BREAKDOWN -- OFFENSE ★

- * The Cowboys compiled four games in 2020 with 500 yards of offense - tied with the 1966, 1978 and 2019 squads for the most such games in franchise history. Only six teams in NFL history have recorded five-or-more games with 500 yards in a season, with Tampa Bay (2018) most recent.
- * Finishing with 413 completions on the year, the Dallas offense was third in the league.
- * The offense had 238 explosive plays of 10-or-more-yards, sixth in the NFL in that category.
- * Dallas' 371.8 yards-per-game was 14th in the NFL.
- * The Cowboys had six pass plays of at least 50 yards, tied for third in the NFL in 2020.
- * Dallas' offense boasted the sixth-most first downs in the league, finishing with 371.

2020 OFFENSIVE REVIEW

- * **Dak Prescott** began his fifth season as the Cowboys quarterback on a historic pace, setting an NFL record for consecutive games with 450 passing yards (three) on his way to passing for 1,690 yards through the first four games of the year - the most by any quarterback through the first four games of a season in NFL history. He led the Cowboys to a 20-point comeback in Week 2 against the Falcons (second-largest comeback in team history) and was on his way to leading a second large comeback in Week 5 against the N.Y. Giants before suffering a season-ending ankle injury in the second half. Despite playing in only five games, Prescott led all NFL passers with three 400-yard games in 2020. Dallas started four quarterbacks throughout the season, the most of any team in 2020, with Andy Dalton offering a steady hand in his nine starts following Prescott's injury. Dalton threw for 2,170 yards and 14 touchdowns against eight interceptions while leading the Cowboys to a 4-5 record.
- * **Ezekiel Elliott** fell just 21 yards short of his fourth 1,000-yard season, rushing for 979 yards with six touchdowns and accumulating 1,317 scrimmage yards to become just the third player in NFL history to start a career with 1,200 scrimmage yards and eight touchdowns in each of his first five years.
- * **Amari Cooper** led the team with a career-best 92 catches for 1,114 yards and five touchdowns, becoming just the 11th player in NFL history to open a career with at least five 1,000-yard seasons in his first six years.
- * Rookie **CeeDee Lamb** broke the Cowboys rookie record for catches in a season, hauling in 74 passes for 935 yards and five touchdowns. He was also one-of-five players in franchise history to score a touchdown three different ways (five receiving, one rushing and one kick return).

★ 2021 QUARTERBACK BREAKDOWN ★

DAK PRESCOTT: After suffering a devastating season-ending injury in Week 5, then signing a four-year contract in March, no one on the roster is chomping at the bit to return to the field more than Dak Prescott. At the time of his injury, Prescott was leading the league in attempts (222), completions (151) and passing yards (1,856). At the time of the injury, Prescott had thrown nine touchdowns passes and added three rushing scores and one receiving. Through his five seasons, Prescott owns a 42-27 regular season record as Dallas' starting quarterback. He is atop the club's rookie quarterback charts for all major passing records and ranked in the top-six of all major club all-time passing figures. After being drafted in the fourth round (135th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Prescott was elevated to the starting role after backup Kellen Moore (leg) and starter Tony Romo (back) were felled with injuries in the preseason. After dropping his NFL debut, Prescott won 11 straight games, helping lead Dallas to a 13-3 record and NFC East Division title while tying Ben Roethlisberger for the NFL's Super Bowl-era record for wins by a rookie and tying Troy Aikman and Tony Romo for wins by a Cowboys quarterback. Prescott earned Pro Bowl berths following the 2016 and 2018 seasons, and as a rookie in 2016, he became the club's first quarterback to win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.

GARRETT GILBERT: Garrett Gilbert signed with Dallas on Oct. 13, 2020 off of Cleveland's practice squad to serve as the primary backup to Andy Dalton, following Prescott's injury. Entering his fourth NFL season, Gilbert spent a majority of his career on the practice squads of the St. Louis Rams (2014) and New England Patriots (2014) and Oakland Raiders in 2015. He was out of football in 2016, then spent the beginning of the 2017 season on the Panthers practice squad before being activated in Oct. and he was a gameday inactive for the remaining 10 games. He played in one game for the Panthers in 2018, going two-of-three for 40 yards. In 2019, Gilbert saw action in five games for the Browns, then earned his first career start with Dallas in 2020 as Dalton (concussion/COVID) was out. Gilbert returns in 2021 to compete for a spot as the primary backup to Prescott.

COOPER RUSH: Cooper Rush signed with Dallas following the 2017 NFL Draft as a rookie free agent with the hopes of earning a shot as a backup quarterback. He became the only rookie free agent in 2017 to make the active roster out of training camp after dazzling in the preseason, completing 38-of-51 passes (74.5%) for 398 yards and six touchdowns against no interceptions, good for a 135.9 quarterback rating. Rush was one of only 10 NFL quarterbacks since 1999 to pass for at least six touchdowns in a single preseason, and he is only the second quarterback to also complete at least 70% of his passes in the same preseason (Aaron Rodgers, 2009-10). He started the season as the club's third quarterback and gameday inactive, but earned his shot as the primary backup starting in Week Seven. Rush saw time in just two games as a rookie, and over the next two seasons in Dallas (2018-19), he played in three games without attempting a pass. Rush spent the early part of 2020 on the N.Y. Giants practice squad then the remainder of the season on Dallas' practice unit.

BEN DINUCCI: Dallas selected Ben DiNucci in the seventh round (231st overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft hoping to groom the young quarterback. As a rookie, DiNucci started one game with Andy Dalton (concussion/COVID) sidelined, but spent a majority of the season as the club's third quarterback.

★ 2021 RUNNING BACK BREAKDOWN ★

EZEKIEL ELLIOTT: For just the second time in franchise history, the Dallas Cowboys used a top-five pick to select a running back when the team chose Ezekiel Elliott with the fourth pick of the 2016 NFL Draft. Elliott did not disappoint as a rookie, leading the NFL with 1,631 yards to become only the fifth rookie since the NFL merger to win the NFL rushing title. His 1,631 rushing yards - third by a rookie in NFL history - were aided by seven 100-yard rushing games - tops by a rookie in team history - and he totaled 1,994 yards from scrimmage which was third by a rookie in league history. Elliott became the fourth rookie in Cowboys history to be named to the Pro Bowl, and only the fourth rookie, second running back, to be named All-Pro in franchise annals. He also took home FedEx Ground Player of the Year. Despite missing six games in 2017 (league-mandated suspension), Elliott led the league, averaging 98.3 yards-per-game, finishing 10th in the league with 983 yards and tied for 11th with seven rushing scores. He topped 1,000 yards in 2018 and 2019, earning his second rushing title with his 1,434 yards in 2018. Just prior to the start of the 2019 season, Elliott signed a six-year extension and finished the season with 1,357 yards and 12 scores (second in his career). Through five seasons, Elliott has rushed for 6,384 yards on 1,413 carries (4.5 avg.) with 46 touchdowns.

TONY POLLARD: Right behind Ezekiel Elliott is Tony Pollard, Dallas' fourth round (128th overall) selection in 2019. Pollard has evolved into a versatile change-of-pace back over the course of the last two seasons, rushing for 890 yards and six touchdowns on 187 attempts (4.8 avg.). He has displayed his ability out of the back field and as a receiver, catching 43 passes for 300 yards and two touchdowns. Dallas will look exploit the skills of their top-two backs, keeping defenses guessing as Pollard looks to evolve his role in the Dallas' offense.

RICO DOWDLE: Rico Dowdle was one of just three rookie free agents to make the squad out of 2020 training camp, and he played in 15 games, mainly on special teams. As a running back, he rushed seven times for 24 yards while returning four kickoffs 152 yards (38.0 avg.) and making three stops on special teams. Dowdle will work through 2021 preseason to again prove himself as a capable backup and special teams player.

★ 2021 RUNNING BACK BREAKDOWN, cont. ★

(FB) SEWO OLONILUA: Sewo Olonilua signed with Dallas as a rookie free agent in 2020 and played in two games, making the most of his status as a roster elevation. While he did not have any stats, he worked through the offseason to improve his skills as a fullback and special teams contributor, and he will make a push for a roster spot in 2021.

JAQUAN HARDY and BRENDEN KNOX: JaQuan Hardy and Brenden Knox both signed with Dallas as rookie free agents following the 2021 NFL Draft. Hardy prepped at Tiffin and finished his career third in school books with 3,207 rushing yards and 28 touchdowns. Knox spent three seasons at Marshall, rushing for 2,852 yards and 24 touchdowns on 550 runs (5.2 avg.).

(FB) NICK RALSTON: Despite finishing his collegiate career in 2019, Nick Ralston was out of football in 2020 and signed as a rookie free agent with Dallas following the 2021 NFL Draft. Ralston spent four years (one redshirt) at Arizona State at both running back and linebacker but finished his collegiate campaign as a grad transfer at Louisiana.

★ 2021 WIDE RECEIVER BREAKDOWN ★

AMARI COOPER: Amari Cooper entered training camp on the Active/PUP list after undergoing offseason ankle surgery. Cooper finished his third season in Dallas leading the team - tied for 11th in the NFL - with a career-best 92 catches for a team-high 1,114 yards with five touchdowns. On the year, he logged four 100-yard games and became just the fourth Dallas player to reach 90 catches in a season. Since his arrival via trade in 2018, Cooper has hauled in 224 passes (ninth in the league over that span), for 3,028 yards (seventh) with 19 touchdowns (tied for 12th). Along with Michael Gallup and CeeDee Lamb, combined with the return of Dak Prescott and a healthy offensive line in 2021, the Dallas Cowboys have arguably one of the most potent offenses in the NFL.

MICHAEL GALLUP: Drafted in the third round (81st overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft, Michael Gallup has slowly, but surely established himself as a reliable, sure-handed target from the wide receiver spot. In his three pro seasons, Gallup has caught 158 passes for 2,457 yards with 13 touchdowns and has quietly become a deep-play threat with soft hands and great foot work. As a compliment to Cooper on the outside, Gallup provides Prescott with a target that will do what it takes to come down with the ball.

CEEDEE LAMB: With the wide receiver all-but shored up going into 2020, the Dallas Cowboys saw fortune fall their way when CeeDee Lamb was still on the board with Dallas' 17th selection in the 2020 NFL Draft. One of the top wide receivers in his draft class, Lamb only added more talent and athleticism to a receiving corps that was already solid. A rookie season that saw Dak Prescott limited to just five games and starts from three other quarterbacks, Lamb still put on display the skills of a first round talent, catching 74 passes for 935 yards and five touchdowns. His dazzling ability helped on special teams, as Lamb served as the club's primary punt returner - 24 returns for 172 yards (7.2) - while also returning an onside kick attempt 47 yards for a touchdown. With one season under his belt, Lamb returns with a greater knowledge of the Cowboys offense and will see more time at multiple receiver positions.

NOAH BROWN: When the Dallas Cowboys selected Noah Brown in the seventh round (239th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, the club was getting size and strength from the receiver position. Brown has proven his skill as a blocker in short yardage situations while also giving the Cowboys another option out wide and as a special teams coverage man. Brown will continue to work through the preseason to maintain his role on the unit.

CEDRICK WILSON: As injuries riddled Cedrick Wilson 's first two seasons after being selected in the sixth round (208th overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft, the tall, quick receiver started to come into his own on offense and special teams in 2020. Seeing time at both receiver and secondary punt returner through all 16 games in 2020, Wilson is looking to shore up his spot on the offense for 2021 with a good showing during the preseason.

MALIK TURNER: The Dallas Cowboys claimed Malik Turner off waivers from Green Bay after the final cut date in 2020. Turner came to Dallas as a young receiver with experience on offense and special teams coverage units, playing in 21 games through his first two seasons in Seattle (2018-19). Originally entering the league as a rookie free agent with Seattle in 2018, Turner will tap into the experience he gained through his first three seasons to make a push for a spot among Dallas' strong receiving corps in 2021.

REGGIE DAVIS, JOHNNIE DIXON and AARON PARKER: First-year players Reggie Davis, Johnnie Dixon and Aaron Parker will all work to show coaches why they deserve a shot on Dallas' roster. Parker may have a leg up as he spent the 2020 season on Dallas' practice squad after the club signed him as a rookie free agent following the 2020 NFL Draft. Davis originally came into the league as a rookie free agent with the Atlanta Falcons in 2017, was waived following training camp, claimed by Cleveland but released a few days later. He then returned to Atlanta's practice squad for the remainder of the season. He did have a stint with the Cowboys in 2018, spending the second half of the season on the practice squad. Dixon signed with Dallas in May 2021 after spending 2020 rehabbing an abdominal injury suffered during 2020 training camp with Arizona. He originally signed as a rookie free agent in 2019 with Houston.

SIMI FEHOKO: The Dallas Cowboys added a tall (6'4") deep-threat receiver when they drafted Simi Fehoko in the fifth round (179th overall). Fehoko, out of Stanford, really came into his own through his last year-plus at Stanford, catching 61 passes for 1,140 yards and nine scores in just 18 games over two years.

BRENNAN EAGLES, OSIRUS MITCHELL, BRANDON SMITH and T.J. VASHER: Considered long shots to make most teams, rookie free agents Brennan Eagles (6'4"), Osirus Mitchell (6'5"), Brandon Smith (6'1") and T.J. Vasher (6'6") all have a realistic opportunity to join the Cowboys 2021 roster as the club looks to get longer and taller at receiver. Signed out of Texas, Eagles played in 32 games in three seasons and caught 61 passes for 1,026 yards and 11 scores for the Longhorns. Mitchell was a four-year letterman at Mississippi State and in 30 starts over 46 games played, he hauled in 107 passes for 1,413 yards and 14 scores.. Smith finished his career at Iowa playing in 38 games and catching 91 passes for 1,046 yards and nine touchdowns. Vasher will be slowed through the first part of camp after landing on the Active/NFI list with a knee injury. Vasher finished his collegiate campaign at Texas Tech with 21 receiving touchdowns, catching 149 passes for 1,983 yards in 42 games played.

★ 2021 TIGHT END BREAKDOWN ★

BLAKE JARWIN: Just as Blake Jarwin was to take the next step as the Cowboys number one tight end, signing a four-year contract extension in March of 2020, the former rookie free agent from Oklahoma State tore his ACL in the season-opener at the LA Rams. Jarwin played in all 16 games over consecutive seasons (2018-19) and started 11 contests, catching 58 balls for 672 yards and six touchdowns. He returns healthy in 2021 to establish his role as the club's number one tight end.

JEREMY SPRINKLE: The Dallas Cowboys signed Jeremy Sprinkle as an unrestricted free agent from Washington in 2021, adding a proven blocker from the outside edge. Originally a fifth round selection (154th overall) by Washington in 2017, Sprinkle played in all 16 games in each of the previous three seasons, earning starts in 28, after starting five-of-11 games played as a rookie. He has 34 catches for 301 yards and three touchdowns on his resume and will look to join Dalton Schultz as Dallas improves its stable of versatile tight ends.

DALTON SCHULTZ: After being selected in the fourth round (137th overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft, Dalton Schultz (out of Stanford) was quietly working as a blocking tight end through his first two seasons. In those two years, he played in 27 games and caught 13 passes for 122 yards. The 2020 season saw him preparing to be the number two tight end, but the ACL injury to Jarwin thrust Schultz into the starting role. Schultz made the most of his opportunity, starting 14 of his 16 games played and caught 63 passes for 615 yards and four touchdowns, including the game-winning score at Minnesota (11/22). Schultz is counting on his experience in 2020 to give the Cowboys another threat on offense.

SEAN MCKEON: Sean McKeon joined Rico Dowdle and Terence Steele as the only rookie free agents to make Dallas' roster out of 2020 training camp. McKeon, a four-year letterman from Michigan, played in 14 games with one start as a rookie, seeing most of his time as a reserve tight end and on special teams.

NICK EUBANKS and ARTAYVIOUS LYNN: Both Nick Eubanks and Artayvious Lynn signed with Dallas as rookie free agents, looking to make the jump in the same fashion as two other current Cowboys tight ends - Jarwin and McKeon. Eubanks, out of Michigan like McKeon, finished his collegiate career playing in 36 games with 19 starts and catching 45 passes for 578 yards and six touchdowns. Lynn played in 34 games over four years at TCU and caught 22 passes for 236 yards and two touchdowns.

★ 2021 OFFENSIVE LINE BREAKDOWN ★

TYRON SMITH: For just the fourth time in team history, and first time since 1981, the Dallas Cowboys selected an offensive lineman in the first round of the draft when they chose Tyron Smith with the ninth overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft. He also became the second-highest offensive lineman drafted in Cowboys history behind John Niland, who was selected fifth in the 1966 Draft. Smith stepped in and immediately took over the starting right tackle spot as a rookie, starting all 16 games he played to become the first rookie to start all 16 games along the offensive line since Rob Petitti in 2005 and the third overall to do so. In his second season, Smith manned the blind side, moving to left tackle - a spot he never relinquished. Since his move to the left side, Smith has earned seven Pro Bowl selections - missing in 2012 and in 2020, after playing in only two games last season. Smith underwent neck surgery after playing in only two games in 2020, returns to full health in 2021 and looks to continue his dominance of opposing defensive linemen.

LA'EL COLLINS: Manning the tackle spot opposite Tyron Smith, the Dallas Cowboys originally signed La'el Collins as a rookie free agent after he had to pull out of the 2015 NFL Draft for personal reasons. Despite being the rookie newcomer on a line that opened holes for the 2014 rushing champion (DeMarco Murray, 1,845 yards), Collins' hard work early in 2015 paid off as he took over the starting left guard spot six games in. By season's end, Collins played in 12 games with 11 starts, helping Darren McFadden to his second career 1,000-yard season, and giving Dallas glimpses of yet another young and talented piece to a dominating offensive front. After suffering a toe injury three weeks into his second season, he returned healthy for 2017 and was the team's starting right tackle, starting all 16 games for the first time in his career. He started all 16 games at right tackle in 2018 and with his 15 games through 2019, started to show his ability as one of the top right tackles in the NFL. He was unable to continue that in 2020 as a preseason hip injury landed him on Reserve/Injured before the season started. After rehabbing the entire year, he returns to full strength in 2021 to make a push for his first Pro Bowl selection.

ZACK MARTIN: For the third time in four NFL Drafts, the Dallas Cowboys selected an offensive lineman in the first round when they picked Zack Martin from Notre Dame in 2014. Martin joined Cowboys first round picks Tyron Smith (2011) and Travis Frederick (2013) as the building blocks for the future of the franchise. In his first season, Martin did not disappoint and was a key part in the league's second-ranked rushing attack. Martin became the first rookie in club history to start all 16 games at right guard and the fourth rookie on the offensive line to start all 16, and he earned a Pro Bowl spot - the only offensive rookie in the NFL in 2014 and the first Cowboys rookie lineman to make the game. He also earned All-Pro honors, becoming only the third rookie in team history to do so. He again manned the right guard spot in 2015, starting all 16 games and earned his second straight Pro Bowl nod and All-Pro honor. In 2016 Martin was part of an offensive line that led the way for the league's leading rusher (Ezekiel Elliott, 1,631 yards) and the NFL's second-ranked rushing attack. En route to his third straight Pro Bowl and All-Pro selections, Martin & Co. also helped rookie quarterback Dak Prescott establish league rookie records in quarterback rating (104.9) and completion percentage (67.8). Behind the line, Prescott became the second player with 3,500-plus pass yards and less than five interceptions (Tom Brady, 2010 and 2016). The 2017 season was a continuation from his previous three as Martin earned his fourth straight trip to the Pro Bowl, starting all 16 games. Martin signed a six-year extension with the Cowboys prior to training camp in 2018 and again earned a Pro Bowl section as one of the top offensive linemen in the league. He again accomplished the feat in 2019, but like his other veteran line-mates, 2020 proved a challenge as he was limited to just 10 games, fighting a calf injury. Also like his other two line-mates, Martin returns to full strength and health in 2021 as a key part to an offense that has the ability to dominate.

CONNOR WILLIAMS: The Dallas Cowboys added to a position of strength on the team in the 2018 NFL Draft with the selection of Texas offensive lineman Connor Williams in the second round (50th overall). Williams earned a starting role at left guard as a rookie, but he was limited to 10 starts in 13 games played, fighting through a knee injury. He returned in 2019, but again knee injuries kept him from five games, as he started 11. His work to return to health in 2020 paid off as he was the lone Dallas Cowboys lineman to start all 16 games. On the season, he missed just one snap. His experience through the challenging 2020 season will pay dividends and help make the Cowboys offensive line the strongest position group on the roster.

TYLER BIADASZ: Drafted in the fifth round (146th overall) in 2020 to compete for the starting center spot vacated by the retirement of Travis Frederick, Tyler Biadasz - like Frederick - played center at Wisconsin. Biadasz himself also fought through injuries, but managed to start four of the 12 games he played, giving him the experience he needs to settle in at center as the youngest piece of the starting five.

TYNSEKHE: The Dallas Cowboys added a veteran security blanket at tackle when they signed TY Nsekhe as an unrestricted free agent from Buffalo in 2021. Now in his eight NFL season, Nsekhe had an unorthodox path to the NFL, first playing Arena Football, then also seeing limited time in the Canadian Football League. He found a home in Washington, where he played in 54 games with 16 starts before landing in Buffalo the last two years. In two seasons with the Bills, Nsekhe was a backup lineman, playing in 25 games with one start.

★ 2021 OFFENSIVE LINE BREAKDOWN, cont. ★

ERIC SMITH: Eric Smith gained a year of experience in the Cowboys offensive system after spending the 2020 season on the club's practice squad. Smith originally signed with Miami as a rookie free agent in 2017 but landed on Reserve/Injured with a knee injury. He spent 2018 with the N.Y. Jets, mostly on their practice squad, then spent 2019 with the N.Y. Giants, playing in two games. He returned to the Giants in 2020, was released at the end of camp, then signed to Dallas's practice squad where he spent the entire season. He was a standard elevation for Dallas in two games in 2020, seeing action in one on special teams.

BRANDON KNIGHT: Brandon Knight begins his third year with Dallas after signing with the club as a rookie free agent in 2019. Through his first two pro seasons, Knight has gained valuable experience, stepping in due to injury at both tackle spots. In two seasons, he has played in 20 games with 10 starts and has shown improvement each time he has had an opportunity. He will again fight for a roster spot as a versatile linemen who has a firm grasp of the club's offense.

CONNOR MCGOVERN: Connor McGovern has consistently shown his improvement of understanding the pro game after being drafted in the third round (90th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. He earned a "redshirt" season as a rookie, tearing his pectoral in training camp and landing on IR for the year. After rehabbing the injury, McGovern stepped up in 2020, starting eight of the 14 games he played, seeing time at right guard in place of Zack Martin (concussion, and right tackle). McGovern will return for his third season and make a stronger push for playing time along a stacked Dallas line.

TERENCE STEELE: Terence Steele was one of three rookie free agents to make Dallas' roster out of 2020 training camp, and the former Texas Tech Red Raider went on to start 14 of the 16 games he played at right tackle. As a rookie, Steele took advantage of the opportunity given to him by the injury to La'el Collins. He gained valuable pro experience and puts himself in a good spot to make the roster in 2021.

ISAAC ALARCON: Isaac Alarcon came to Dallas in 2020 as part of the NFL's International Player Pathway Program. Hailing from Mexico, Alarcon gained valuable experience on Dallas' practice squad, and he returns in 2021 in the final year of the program. He will look to gain some live-action playing time in the preseason.

JOSH BALL: Dallas selected Josh Ball in the fourth round (138th overall) of the 2021 Draft in the hopes the club has found a tackle for the future. With the ability to play both tackle spots, and standing at 6'8", Ball is the tallest man on the roster. He spent two collegiate seasons (one redshirt) at Florida State), one at Butler Junior College and two at Marshall.

MATT FARNIOK: With their final selection in the 2021 NFL Draft (238th overall), the Dallas Cowboys drafted Matt Farniok, a guard out of Nebraska. He started 36 of the 39 contests he played for the Huskers. He proved himself to be a versatile athlete, playing at right tackle, right guard and center throughout his career.

BRAYLON JONES: As the lone rookie free agent in camp on the offensive line, Braylon Jones (Houston) looks to earn a roster spot as the backup center. Through the offseason, he honed his skills as the backup snapper and will look to impress coaches through the preseason.

★ PERSONNEL BREAKDOWN -- DEFENSE ★

* The Dallas defense forced 23 takeaways in 2020, tied for seventh in the NFL. The last time Dallas finished in the top-10 in takeaways was 2014 when the defense had 31 takeaways to finish second.

* The Cowboys led the NFL in takeaways (16) since coming off its bye in Week 11. The Cowboys finished 2020 with 23 takeaways, which tied for seventh in the NFL and is the most by a Dallas defense since 2014.

* The Dallas defense yielded 386.4 yards-per-game, 23rd in the NFL. The Cowboys passing defense allowed 227.6, good for 11th while the run defense permitted 158.1 - 31st in the NFL.

* In allowing a third down conversion percentage of 46.9, Dallas was 26th.

2020 DEFENSIVE REVIEW

* **Jaylon Smith** led the defense with 161 tackles - his third consecutive 150-tackle season, the first Dallas defender since Bradie James (2008-10) with three consecutive 150-tackle seasons.

* **DeMarcus Lawrence** led the way with 6.5 sacks and 37 pressures - the fourth time in his career he led the team in sacks.

* Rookie cornerback **Trevon Diggs** became the first rookie since Byron Jones to lead the Cowboys in pass breakups (14) and only the third rookie in team history to do so. Diggs is also the only rookie defender in Cowboys history to lead the team in pass breakups and interceptions outright. (Cowboys did not track PBUs before 1984).

★ 2021 DEFENSIVE LINE BREAKDOWN ★

DEMARCUS LAWRENCE: With an immediate need for an impact player at right defensive end, the Dallas Cowboys packaged their original second (47th overall) and third round (78th overall) draft choices and moved up in the second round of the 2014 NFL Draft in a trade with Washington to select DeMarcus Lawrence with the 34th overall pick. Lawrence really came into his own in 2017, starting all 16 games for the first time in his career and earned his first career Pro Bowl selection after tying for second in the NFL with a career-high 14.5 sacks. He also finished the year with 52 hurries - the most by a Cowboy since Charles Haley's 52 in 1994. Since the beginning of the 2017 season, Lawrence has played in all 16 games each year and has started every game, except two. For his career, Lawrence has racked up 45.5 sacks, 47 tackles for losses, 14 forced fumbles, 214 hurries and 257 tackles, starting 78-of-96 games played.

CARLOS WATKINS: Carlos Watkins came to Dallas via free agency in 2021 as an unrestricted free agent from Houston. The fifth-year pro was drafted in the fourth round (142nd overall) by the Texans in 2017 and has started 18 of the 42 games he played, posting 74 tackles, 4.0 sacks and five tackles for losses. In Dallas, he will compete for one of the starting interior linemen spots.

NEVILLE GALLIMORE: In the third round (82nd overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys selected interior lineman Neville Gallimore. The Canadian-born Oklahoma Sooner worked his way to a starting role in his rookie season, playing in 14 games with nine starts to tally 26 tackles, four for losses, half sack and 12 pressures. Gallimore's hard work through the offseason should put him in prime position for a breakout sophomore season.

RANDY GREGORY: The Dallas Cowboys welcomed back edge rusher Randy Gregory in 2020, after the former second round (60th overall) pick from the 2015 NFL Draft has missed the majority of his career to league-mandated suspensions. After being brought on cautiously last season to work him back into football shape, Gregory put his pass-rushing and all-around skill set on display for coaches. By season's end, Gregory played in 10 games and posted 17 tackles, 3.5 sacks, three tackles for losses, 16 pressures and three forced fumbles. With the ability to participate in a full offseason and training camp, Gregory should easily earn a starting spot on the edge to pair with DeMarcus Lawrence to form a formidable pass-rushing duo.

★ 2021 DEFENSIVE LINE BREAKDOWN, CONT. ★

BRENT URBAN: To bolster the interior of the Cowboys defensive line, the club signed Brent Urban as an unrestricted free agent from Chicago. Urban spent the majority of his seven pro seasons clogging the line of scrimmage, allowing the pursuit players the lanes they need to make the tackle. After being selected in the fourth round (134th overall) in 2014 by Baltimore, Urban has crashed pockets for the Ravens (2014-18), Tennessee (2019) and Chicago (2019-20), starting 27 of the 70 games he played. He has made 103 tackles, 6.0 sacks, five tackles for loss, nine pressures and seven breakups through his career.

TARELL BASHAM: The Dallas Cowboys tabbed Tarell Basham (unrestricted free agent from the N.Y. Jets) as an additional piece of the puzzle to help improve the defense in 2021. The former linebacker in the Jets 3-4 defense, Basham will see time as an edge lineman in Dallas' defense. After being drafted in the third round (80th overall) by the Indianapolis Colts in 2017, Basham played in 15 games for the Colts as a rookie. He returned to Indianapolis, was waived after Week 1, then signed with the Jets where he played in 42 games with 12 starts over the last two-plus years. He has posted 7.5 sacks, six tackles for losses, 23 pressures, 10 breakups, four forced fumbles and 84 tackles through his career.

DORANCE ARMSTRONG: Looking for a breakout year under Dan Quinn is Dallas' fourth round selection (116th overall) from 2018 in Dorance Armstrong. Armstrong has spent the first three years of his pro career as a key reserve at defensive end for Dallas, playing in 46 games with three starts. He has posted 64 tackles, 2.5 sacks, 23 pressures, two breakups, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries and will work to take the next step at this level.

JUSTIN HAMILTON: Justin Hamilton was brought in as a street free agent in 2019 to be a space-eater for the Dallas Cowboys defense. With the prototypical build for an interior lineman (6'2", 315 pounds), Hamilton has provided Dallas with a run stopper in the middle. He served as a reserve in 2020, playing in 10 games and posting 11 tackles and six pressures.

TRYSTEN HILL: Coming off an ACL injury that ended his 2020 season, just as he was coming into his own, Dallas' second round (58th overall) pick from 2019, Trysten Hill will begin the preseason on Active/PUP. Hill started all five games (the first starts of his short career) he played in 2020, prior to the injury, and logged 14 tackles, one for a loss and five pressures.

BRADLEE ANAE: The Dallas Cowboys liked the upside in Bradlee Anae when the club drafted him in the fifth round (179th overall) in 2020. The second-year pro entered camp with seven games played as a rookie, seeing most of his time on special teams. Getting more work along the defensive line in preseason will be key for Anae as he makes a push for a roster spot on Dan Quinn's new defense.

RON'DELL CARTER: Ron'Dell Carter signed with Dallas as a rookie free agent following the 2020 draft. He was released at the end of training camp, signed to Dallas' practice squad, then plucked off the squad by Indianapolis. His stint with the Colts lasted almost six weeks as a gameday inactive before his release and quick re-signing to Dallas' active roster. In his return to Dallas, Carter played in three games as a reserve tackle and, with extra work through the offseason and preseason, should be a contender for a roster spot in the fall.

AZUR KAMARA: Azur Kamara came to Dallas following the 2020 NFL Draft as a rookie free agent signing, but the outside linebacker's season never got underway as a knee injury sidelined him for the season and landed him on Reserve/Injured. Through his work rehabbing, Kamara returns in 2021 in full health and will make the switch to defensive end.

QUINTON BOHANNA, AUSTIN FAOLI, CHAUNCEY GOLSTON and OSA ODIGHIZUWA: As a position of need going into the 2021 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys addressed their defensive line with the selections of tackle Osa Odighizuwa (third round, 75th overall), end Chauncey Golston (third round, 84th overall) and tackle Quinton Bohanna (sixth round, 192nd overall). While Golston begins camp on Active/PUP, nursing a hamstring injury, Bohanna and Odighizuwa should take advantage of their reps as they adjust to the pro game. Austin Faoli is also in the mix on the line after signing with Dallas as rookie free agent following the 2021 Draft. The defensive end showed flashes of his ability through his four-year career with Oregon.

★ 2021 LINEBACKERS BREAKDOWN ★

JAYLON SMITH: Manning the starting middle linebacker position in Dan Quinn's new defense will be Jaylon Smith. Smith, now in his fifth pro season, came off a 2020 campaign that saw him lead the team with 161 tackles - second in his career - while topping 150 tackles for his third consecutive season. Smith, originally drafted in the second round (34th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, missed his entire rookie season, spending it rehabbing a horrific knee injury suffered in his last collegiate game - the 2016 Fiesta Bowl.

LEIGHTON VANDER ESCH: Looking to return to form under Dan Quinn is Leighton Vander Esch, who will return to man the outside in 2021, after sliding inside last season. Vander Esch finished 2020 with 73 tackles, missing six games with a broken clavicle (Weeks 2-5) and a sprained ankle (Weeks 16-17). Despite battling injuries the previous two seasons, Vander Esch has tallied 336 tackles in 35 games played (30 starts) since being drafted 19th overall in 2018 out of Boise State.

MICAH PARSONS: With the 12th pick in the 2021 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys bolstered their front seven when they snagged one of the top overall athletes in the draft with the selection of Micah Parsons from Penn State. The young linebacker sat out 2020 (COVID) after leading the Nittany Lions defense in tackles as a freshman (83) and sophomore (109). Dallas coaches expect big things from the versatile Parsons early in his career.

KEANU NEAL: Keanu Neal came to Dallas in 2021 as an unrestricted free agent from Atlanta to join Dan Quinn after playing for Quinn through his first five years in the league. After being drafted in the first round (17th overall) by Atlanta in 2016, Neal missed the first two games of his career, then started the next 31 at safety for a stout Falcons defense. He makes the switch to linebacker in 2021 after showing his ability to play close to the line of scrimmage in nickel situations. Despite suffering season-ending injuries in 2018 (knee) and 2019 (Achilles), Neal has posted 332 tackles, 14 for losses, starting 48-of-49 games played.

LUKE GIFFORD: After landing with Dallas in 2019 as a rookie free agent, Luke Gifford will continue to work towards an increased role on Dallas' defense and continue to improve his skills as a solid special teams coverage man. In his two pro seasons, Gifford has taken most of his snaps on coverage, totally 13 special teams tackles through 14 games played.

FRANCIS BERNARD: Francis Bernard earned a roster spot in 2020 after signing with Dallas as a rookie free agent following the NFL Draft. As a rookie, Bernard played in 13 games, mostly on special teams, and tallied one defensive tackle with four stops on coverage units.

JABRIL COX and ANTHONY HINES: In what could prove to be the steal of the draft, Jabril Cox was selected by Dallas in the fourth round (115th overall) in 2021. Cox, who finished his career at LSU after playing for FCS powerhouse North Dakota State. Through his collegiate career, Cox has shown his skill as a highly productive linebacker with outstanding coverage skills. Anthony Hines rounds out the linebacking corps after signing with Dallas as a rookie free agent following the 2021 Draft. Prepping just miles away from The Star at Plano East, Hines played in 27 games through three years at Texas A&M, sitting out his senior season due to COVID.

★ 2021 SECONDARY BREAKDOWN ★

ANTHONY BROWN: The longest-tenured member of Dallas' secondary is now Anthony Brown, whom Dallas drafted in the sixth round (189th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft. Brown has proved himself as a solid cornerback through his time, starting both outside and in the nickel. He has started 41-of-66 games played and tallied 216 tackles, 35 breakups and six interceptions while tacking on 4.0 sacks coming off the edge.

JOURDAN LEWIS: The Dallas Cowboys added a talented and driven cornerback with their third round draft pick (92nd overall) in the 2017 draft when they selected Jourdan Lewis out of Michigan. Lewis has settled into his role as a slot corner, starting 26-of-61 career games. He has totaled 176 tackles, four interceptions and four fumble recoveries, while coming into his own in corner blitz situations, posting 6.0 sacks in the last two seasons.

TREVON DIGGS: The Dallas Cowboys hoped they struck gold by selecting a dominant shutdown corner in Trevon Diggs in the second round (51st overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. Diggs came in as a rookie and earned the starting job, opening 11 of the 12 games he played, missing four with a broken foot. Diggs, who plays like a wide receiver in the form of his brother, Stefon, led the team outright in interceptions - the first Cowboys rookie to accomplish the feat since Terence Newman in 2003. His three interceptions were part of a 56-tackle, 1.0-sack, 14-pass breakup and one-forced fumble stat line. He should improve as a player, thus improving Dallas' coverage unit, as a second-year pro.

DAMONTAE KAZEE: Familiar with Dan Quinn's methods, and new to Dallas in 2021, Damontae Kazee arrived as an unrestricted free agent from Atlanta. Kazee, who was drafted in the fifth round (149th overall) by the Falcons, played for Head Coach Quinn for his first years at safety in the NFL. Kazee has a knack for the ball, picking off 10 passes over two seasons (2018-19). Kazee was just getting started in 2020 before a torn Achilles ended his season. He will bring a knowledge of the defense and the ability to play the ball in a re-vamped Cowboys secondary.

DONOVAN WILSON: Donovan Wilson was drafted in the sixth round (213th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft, and after seeing time as a reserve special teamer as a rookie, earned a starting safety spot in his second season, starting 10-of-14 games played. Wilson, who had a breakout second half of the season, began establishing himself as a heavy hitter with the ability to separate the ball carrier from the ball, forcing three fumbles and picking off two passes to go with 67 tackles, four breakups, two fumble recoveries and 3.5 sacks.

C.J. GOODWIN: The Dallas Cowboys rewarded C.J. Goodwin, considered by many the top special teams coverage man in the league, when they signed the sixth-year pro to a two-year extension in 2021. Beginning his fourth season in Dallas, Goodwin led all Cowboys in special teams tackles over the previous two seasons, tying his career-high with 10 stops each year. Despite seeing limited time on defense, his speed and athleticism is only an asset as a reserve defender and top special teams ace.

JAYRON KEARSE: Jayron Kearsse embarks on his first year in Dallas after spending four seasons in Minnesota (2016-19) and the majority of 2020 with Detroit. After being drafted in the seventh round (244th overall) by the Vikings, Kearsse went on to play 62 games (with four starts) in Minnesota before leaving for the Lions via free agency. Through his career, he has seen action in 73 games, starting 12, and has tallied 112 tackles, 10 breakups, one interception, one forced fumble, four pressures and a half sack.

DARIAN THOMPSON: Darian Thompson landed in Dallas in 2018 to provide the club with a solid special teams coverage man and someone who can push for a starting safety spot. In his three seasons with the Cowboys, Thompson has played in 40 games, with 11 starts, after arriving from the N.Y. Giants, starting all 16 games in 2017. He was drafted in the third round (71st overall) by the N.Y. Giants and has made 171 tackles, four for losses, 10 breakups, two interceptions, one fumble recovery and one forced fumble through 58 games played.

MAURICE CANADY: Maurice Canady joins the Cowboys after opting out of the 2020 season (COVID), when he signed with the club as an unrestricted free agent from the N.Y. Jets. Despite sitting out one season, Canady has pushed himself through the offseason to return to pro form and fight for a roster spot. He has seen action in 32 games, starting five, through four pro seasons. Canady was the Baltimore Ravens sixth round (209th overall) selection in the 2016 NFL Draft.

MALIK HOOKER: Added in the second week of training camp, Malik Hooker looks to return to form after missing most of the 2020 season with a torn Achilles with the Indianapolis Colts. Dallas has the hopes of Hooker filling in the starting safety spot the Cowboys have coveted for years, despite the fifth-year pro returning from a season-ending injury. Hooker started 35-of-36 games played with the Colts since Indianapolis used the 15th overall pick in the 2017 NFL Draft to select him. For his career, Hooker has tallied 123 tackles, seven interceptions, 11 breakups and two fumble recoveries.

DEANTE BURTON: Deante Burton came to Dallas in the second half of 2019 to provide the club youth with some experience at cornerback. He played as a reserve in three games upon arrival and returned with Dallas in 2020, spending a majority of the year on the club's practice squad. After signing with Atlanta as a rookie free agent in 2017, he spent his rookie year on the Falcons practice squad before gaining experience with Green Bay, Houston and Indianapolis over the next two seasons.

STEVEN PARKER: The Dallas Cowboys added Steven Parker to their practice squad in 2020, hoping to develop a game-changing safety. Parker cut his teeth on the practice squad for his first month in Dallas before earning a roster spot and playing in eight games as a reserve safety and on special teams. Parker originally entered the league as a rookie free agent with the LA Rams in 2018, spent the season on their practice squad, then played in 14 games with four starts for the Miami Dolphins in 2019. Parker will work through his first Cowboys training camp and continue to fight for a spot on Dallas' secondary.

KYRON BROWN: One week into training camp, the Dallas Cowboys signed Kyron Brown to compete for a spot at cornerback. Brown spent the entire 2020 season on Reserve/PUP continuing to rehab a quad injury he suffered with the N.Y. Jets in 2019. He originally signed with the Jets as a rookie free agent in 2019 and tallied five tackles in three games - one start - before suffering the quad injury.

REGGIE ROBINSON: Reggie Robinson was drafted in the fourth round (123rd overall) in the 2020 NFL Draft by Dallas and made the switch to safety as a rookie. He played in five games, mostly on special teams, and notched one tackle and a forced fumble on coverage units. He will return to his natural position at cornerback in 2021 and will work to show coaches why he was a fourth round pick just one year ago.

KELVIN JOSEPH, TYLER COYLE, ISRAEL MUKUAMU and NAHSHON WRIGHT: Kelvin Joseph (second round, 44th overall), Israel Mukuamu (sixth round, 227th overall) and Nahshon Wright (third round, 99th overall) were all 2021 draft picks and will be expected to impact the defense as rookies. Joseph played just two years of collegiate ball, 2018 at LSU and 2020 at Kentucky, playing in 20 games with nine starts but picking off four passes in the span. Mukuamu displayed position flex at South Carolina, playing both safety and corner and standing 6'4". Mukuamu started 19 of the 31 games he played for the Gamecocks and stole seven passes over his three seasons. Wright, also a long defender (6'4") will work at cornerback after picking off nine passes in three seasons at Oregon State (2019-20) and Laney Junior College. Rounding out the secondary roster is rookie free agent Tyler Coyle, who finished his collegiate career as a grad transfer at Purdue after playing 35 games over three seasons at UConn.

★ PERSONNEL BREAKDOWN -- SPECIAL TEAMS ★

* The Dallas Cowboys averaged a start at their 26.6-yard line following kickoffs, fourth in the NFL. The club allowed opponents to start at their 25.2-yard line, tied for 16th.

* In averaging 26.1 yards-per-kick return, Dallas was third in the league. By giving up 20.9, the Cowboys were ninth.

* Dallas' average of 6.6 yards-per-punt return was good for 13th. On the coverage side, the unit was 18th, yielding 8.8.

* With a net punting average of 41.2, the Cowboys were 13th and the punt return unit was eighth, allowing a 38.8-yard net.

2020 SPECIAL TEAMS REVIEW

* **Greg Zuerlein** made 34-of-41 field goals on the year, tied for the most field goals in Cowboys single-season history, and his 135 points tied for second.

* For the second consecutive season, **C.J. Goodwin** led the team in special teams tackles with a career-high tying 10.

★ 2021 SPECIAL TEAMS BREAKDOWN ★

JAKE MCQUAIDE: After 16 seasons of consistency at long snapper, the Dallas Cowboys made a switch to a veteran player, who is familiar with Special Teams Coordinator John Fassel, in Jake McQuaide. Ready to launch his 11th pro season, McQuaide played 10 years for the Rams, including eight with Fassel. McQuaide earned Pro Bowl selections following the 2016 and 2017 seasons and also appeared in Super Bowl LII.

BRYAN ANGER: With the change at long snapper for 2021, the Dallas Cowboys will also see a change at punter, as the club signed 10-year veteran Bryan Anger. Anger was drafted in the third round (70th overall) by Jacksonville in 2012 and has played in 142 games through his first nine seasons. He missed just two games in 2019 as he signed with the Houston Texans for Week 3. For his career, Anger has averaged 46.2 yards-per-punt with a net of 40.7, 232 downed inside the 20 and 49 touchbacks on 651 punts.

GREG ZUERLEIN: In his second season in Dallas - 10th in the NFL - Greg Zuerlein will again handle kicking duties after arriving in Dallas in 2020 as an unrestricted free agent. In 2020 Zuerlein totaled 135 points - tied for second by a kicker in team history - while tying for the most field goals made (34) and establishing a club record with 41 field goal attempts. For his career, Zuerlein has rang true on 235-of-286 field goals (82.2) and 297-of-306 (97.1) PATs for 1,002 points. On kickoffs, he forces a touchback on 66.9% of his kicks and his teams allow an average of 23.1 yards-per-return. Zuerlein will begin the preseason on the Active/NFI list with a back injury.

HUNTER NISWANDER: Hunter Niswander will see extended action at kicker during the 2021 preseason with Zuerlein on active/NFI. Niswander landed in Dallas midway through the 2020 season after Chris Jones (abdomen) was forced to Reserve/Injured. As a rookie in the NFL, Niswander played in eight games and punted 26 times with a 47.2 average, 42.0 net with 10 downed inside the 20 and two touchbacks. He also gained experience in the spring of 2020 with the XFL's D.C. Defenders.
